American Counseling Association (ACA)

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<u>The ACA Code of Ethics</u> describes professional standards for counselors with the purpose of protecting the dignity and well-being of clients. The main reasons for the code of ethics include informing professional counselors and counselors-in-training of their ethical guidelines, professional obligations, and responsibilities to their clients. This helps counselors decide on an appropriate plan of action for their clients and provides the ethical standards by which complaints and inquiries can be made regarding ACA members.

American Psychological Association (APA)

The APA publishes the <u>Ethical Principles of Psychologists and Code of Conduct</u>, which are standards of conduct set forth to provide guidance to psychologists as they conduct activities in their scientific, educational, or professional roles. This ethics code applies to activities across a variety of contexts, such as in person, written communications, telephone, Internet, and other electronic transmissions. Membership in the APA commits members and student affiliates to comply with the standards of the APA Ethics Code and to the rules and procedures used to enforce them.
